Course Description


Phil 111 Contemporary Worldviews (1, 2 or 3 hours)

An exploration of the assumptions of contemporary approaches to issues in society. Includes the study of New Age, Marxism, Naturalism, and Theism. (This course is offered only in conjunction with Summit Ministries)

The class is team-taught by professors with expertise in the following areas: theology, philosophy, ethics, science, psychology, sociology, political science, history, economics, and law.

Course Objectives

1. Articulate a factual foundation for their chosen worldview.
2. Understand several influential worldviews: Theism, Naturalism, Postmodernism, Secular Humanism, Islam, and New Age.



3. Develop basic skills of disciplined inquiry by comparing and contrasting the various worldviews.
4. Apply an understanding of worldviews to the natural sciences, the social sciences, the humanities, and biblical studies.

Multicultural Objectives

To be aware of considerations necessary to address societal, ethnic, and cultural needs.

Textbook

Course Requirements

- Attendance—attendance at all class periods is required, and unexcused absences or tardies will reduce your grade.
- Class Notes—you must take clear, concise, well-organized notes on all lectures.
- Comprehensive Exam—at the end of the course, you must pass a multiple-choice exam covering the material given during the lectures (there will be an average of three to six questions from each lecture).
- Worldview Essay—during the second week of the course, you must submit a two-page essay stating the main ideas of the worldview lectures given by Dr. Jeff Myers and/or Tripp Almon
- Research Paper (three credit option only)—you must submit a research paper on one of two predetermined topics within one month of the end of the course. This paper must include at least ten typed pages, with an additional title page and bibliography. Footnotes are required for all citations. (Your grade on this paper will be solely based on: first, adherence to the above instructions; second, use of proper grammar, spelling, punctuation, etc.; and, third, how well your paper proves your chosen research statement.)
- Additional Readings (Two and Three credit)-- You must read the first two Chapters in Understanding the Times. Two credit students need to read an additional two chapters within chapters 8-17 and Three Credit students need to read four additional chapters in Understanding the Times chapters 8-17.
- Open Forum-- You must attend at least three Open Forums during your time at Summit.

1 credit hour

- Take a college credit comprehensive exam based on Summit lectures

2 credit hours

- Write a 2-page worldview essay (due 2nd Thursday of the session)
- Take a college credit comprehensive exam based on graduation Friday.
- Read assigned excerpts of Understanding the Times Chapters 1 and 2 as well as 2 additional chapters from Chapters 8-17
- Attend Three Open Forums

3 credit hours

- Write a 2-page worldview essay (due 2nd Thursday of the session)
- Take a college credit comprehensive exam based on graduation Friday.
- Write a 12-page minimum research paper (due 30 days after your session ends)



- Read assigned excerpts of Understanding the Times chapters 1 and 2 as well as 4 additional chapters from Chapters 8-17
- Attend Three Open Forums

- 35% Research Paper

- 10% amount of *Understanding the Times* completed
